

Two leading, accredited, not-for-profit agencies, DeafBlind Ontario Services and PHSS, have formed an integrative partnership to jointly advocate for and provide high quality, holistic and robust community supports to individuals who have highly specialized and unique needs across Ontario. The partnership comes at a time when significant changes are underway in Ontario's health and social support systems as a means to help ensure these populations' needs continue to be recognized and addressed.

The objective of the partnership is to develop opportunities to integrate administration, systems and approaches that will allow for more efficient, person-focused services while operating in a more cost-effective manner. The partnership will enhance the ability of DeafBlind Ontario Services and PHSS to share specialized expertise and services for the benefit of the people they support, while working together to promote the unique needs of these populations who require access to integrated support services and health care across Ontario.

Our two organizations provide different but complementary services: DeafBlind Ontario Services is a not-for-profit organization that helps individuals who are deafblind to increase their independence and improve their quality of life through specialized services. They provide Intervenor Services, trained specialists who facilitate the exchange of information and assist with communication to empower people with deafblindness to thrive. While we, at PHSS, continue to provide 24-hour support to people with significant developmental and/or physical disabilities and complex medical needs so they can live in their own homes, participate in the community, and enjoy life with family and friends.

This is a big year for DeafBlind Ontario! They are celebrating 30 years as a leader in the field, providing specialized services and support to individuals with deafblindness. Founded in 1989, their reach extends with programs across the province into a wide range of communities in Ontario. Please help us congratulate them on this milestone!

We are looking forward to growing this partnership, and our combined presence across Ontario, to ensure these populations' needs continue to be recognized and addressed.

THE CHANGING HEALTHCARE LANDSCAPE

Ontario Health Teams are being introduced to provide a new way of organizing and delivering care that is more connected to people in their local communities. Under Ontario Health Teams, health care providers (including hospitals, doctors and home and community care providers) will aim to work as one coordinated team.

It is a time of great change in the healthcare sector, and PHSS has worked diligently to be part of the discussion and ensure that our complex population has a voice at the table. Two teams we are involved in proceeded to the full application stage, and two are currently in development for the next round of applications. During the first set of OHT announcements in November, one of the applications in which we are a full signing partner was identified as one of the first 24 Ontario Health Teams.

DID YOU KNOW?

In 2012, 1 in 7 Canadians aged 15 or older reported having a disability

We have developed a unique combination of residential living, home supports, day programs and recreation to meet the needs of people who have significant disabilities but also have much to offer our community – people who are good neighbours and great citizens. To meet the ongoing and future requirements of the people we support and those who could benefit from our services, Participation House Foundation has identified four areas of need:

Equipment

More than 8 out of 10 persons with disabilities use aids and assistive devices; having the appropriate aids can enable an individual to participate more fully in society.* For people meeting the challenge of multiple disabilities, up-to-date and well-maintained equipment is essential to maintain health and support independence and community involvement. The items range from something as simple as a shower commode to sophisticated communications devices or a \$25,000 air bed that helps prevent pressure ulcers.

Housing and Accessibility

PHSS homes are very special places. From the outside they look like any other warm and comfortable family home. Inside, modifications are made to ensure they are ideal for the people we support. Each person has a private bedroom that is a reflection of his or her personality. These houses quickly become homes, much loved by those who live there. While government funding may be available, it does not cover all expenses. PHSS understands its responsibility as a good neighbour to properly maintain our homes, both inside and out. Private funding and/or gifts-in-kind are welcome to create new homes when operational funds are available from the government.

Transportation and Travel

Many of the people we support face significant mobility challenges, and are unable to get around without a wheelchair. When they want to leave their homes to participate in community activities, a van equipped with a wheelchair lift is essential. The goal is to pair each location with their own van, but many are still relying on ParaTransit.

We currently anticipate that four of our accessible vans will need replacement within the next year.

Reliable access to transportation is necessary for unexpected medical appointments or other urgent situations. Also, the spontaneity of activity such as going to see a movie, window-shopping at the mall or grabbing a coffee with friends at Tim Horton's is not an option when Paratransit must be booked days in advance. **An accessible van costs approximately \$65,000, with annual maintenance, gas and insurance costs of about \$15,000.**

Like anyone else, the people we support sometimes need a chance to unwind, have new experiences, see the world and visit distant family and friends. But travel, whether for a holiday or to compete in a bocce ball tournament, is difficult because of the additional costs for a full-time attendant. Private funding would allow more people to take holidays – a pleasure most of us take for granted.

Education, Training and Therapy

Education, support and advocacy are ongoing needs for the people we support and their families. Additional funding would allow more people to participate in conferences and other educational activities, as well as provide therapy such as Occupational Therapy, physiotherapy, and specialized technology.

Our staff members, too, have ongoing education needs to ensure they can provide the best possible care and support. Government funding covers basic required training in areas such as first aid and CPR. It is more difficult to find funds for leadership, values training or training in specialized computer skills.

PILLAR COMMUNITY AWARDS

Healing Through the Arts was nominated for a Pillar Innovation Award in the Collaboration category, and selected as a top 3 finalist! Videos were created for each finalist, and were shown to almost 1000 participants at the award ceremony. Although we were not the award winner, there were numerous comments on how impressive and enriching the Healing Through the Arts program is. It was an honour to be recognized and to bring awareness to the program.



WHAT IS HEALING THROUGH THE ARTS?

In collaboration with London Arts Council, L'Arche, and Hutton House, we developed a project called Healing Through the Arts to assist people who previously lived within institutions. The majority of these people do not use words to communicate, and have been overlooked and misunderstood as they cannot talk about their experiences. This project offers a creative solution to help them heal. Rather than providing



formal art and music therapy where a medical model is used towards a clinical outcome, this program model involves participants in community-based art making and creative process, facilitated by professional artist-educators.

POSSIBILITIES IN PAINT where art is more than a pretty picture

As a staff member, when I was told I would be taking Diane to art I thought, "Me? You want me to do art? This isn't going to work, I have no art skills" but Diane and I went. At first, she was just like me and thought she didn't have the skills so she couldn't do art.

What we learned with the help of the wonderful Kathleen, is that EVERYONE can do art. Art became Diane's favourite activity and, as time went on, she no longer needed hand-over-hand assistance: she told me, "I can do it myself."

I looked forward to this shift every time because I had the opportunity to watch her grow and learn new skills and techniques. I started to see the confidence she was building through art transfer over to her everyday life. Art was giving her independence, confidence, and skills that she was able to use every day. Diane always beamed with pride when she finished a piece of artwork, and Kathleen always made Diane feel special, like she could do anything she put her mind to.

Unfortunately, Diane passed away in November 2018. This is when I saw the other very important part of Possibilities in Paint. Her family had beautiful keepsakes: pictures, cards and ornaments that Diane had made herself, and I saw the comfort it brought to her family to have those special treasures. We often think art is hard and takes special skills, but it doesn't have to. As Kathleen would say, you can't make a mistake. Possibilities in Paint opened my eyes and has taught me so much more than art.

the top 3—they were all so creative! Congratulations to Project Hope for taking home 1st place!










BAKING COOKIES WITH BRYAN

AN EXPERIENCE OF A LIFETIME!

A past student who worked with PHSS through the Community Engaged Learning program at Western University put forth Sandra's name to attend an "Equitable AI in Public Health" conference in Toronto. Sandra and three staff attended this conference, and we did not realize how big of a deal it was to be included!

The participants included AI (Artificial Intelligence) professionals flown in from Switzerland and the UK. It also included health group professionals, and experts from the community to provide input on Equitable AI in Public Health.

The discussion was lead through three "Fishbowl" exercises that allowed all three expert groups (AI, Health, and Community) to share and discuss their ideas while the other two groups were positioned around the outside of the room, allowed to listening to the conversation and contribute their questions and comments at the end. This respectful approach allowed for each group to provide their thoughts and brainstorm together, and gave time for all others to think about what was said before interjecting.



- Panel 1 was the Al expert group, who were specialists in their sector and discussed Al software.
- Panel 2 consisted of specialists in the healthcare sector, and discussed pros/cons of Al use in public health.
- Panel 3 (that's where we came in!) was the community group. This
 discussion was about limited access to technology including financial barriers, as well as how Al should
 be a collaborative effort and co-designed for accessibility. (Building the technology and incorporating
 accessibility needs, rather than developing and then adapting it for accessibility)

This experience was like no other! We were honoured to have been asked to participate in this conference because we were included with the academic research community and our opinion was valued. In the room, Sandra's disability was invisible; she was respected and seen for her thoughts and opinions. Everyone was there to learn from one another.

Western University and the University of Toronto deserve a special shout out for creating the most accessible experience for Sandra. They removed a table to accommodate for accessibility so that she was able to sit in line with everyone else. They ensured that she felt included, even dining at the elegant faculty lounge at U of T.

It was an amazing experience professionally, personally, and socially. It was a great opportunity for networking, creating many new insights within PHSS (possibilities for AI, connections for legal guardianship, potential student placement, future initiatives with Western, and more.)

You never know where a path may lead... Sandra may be published in an academic journal!


MATTHEW MEETS LOCAL FACEBOOK CELEBRITY
